All men live most of their first year of life inside of a woman – their mother

Close to her heart, living in and of her body

Born through a very delicate part of her body

Nursed at her breasts

Held close

That is bonding – that is good

Mothers love their sons – and that is good

And care for them in many ways - and that is good

But sometimes it is taken too far or lasts too long or is manipulative and controlling

Even after the sons are old enough to care for themselves

Even after the sons are dating and married

Mothers can dote on their sons

This will cause many problems

Boys grow up expecting and receiving good from their mothers

They then generalize this to expecting and demanding good from all women

All women are to serve them and meet their needs

(And plenty of women seem willing to provide this)

They take this into dating and expect the girls to meet their needs

Expect girls to set the standard for dating – this is wrong

Sets girls up as being in charge

Shows weakness of young men

What to do?

Fathers must convey to sons the need for them to be men

Young men/boys must make the transition from being boys to being men

(Mothers typically complicate this process)

Boy will **not** be boys – boys will be men

It is fine for boys to be boys when they are boys but

They must grow out of this stage

Stages of a man's life:

Prenatal – Infancy – Boyhood (no adolescence) – Young manhood – Manhood – Mentor – Patriarch

Between boyhood and young manhood a change must occur

He must now move from being cared for by women to him caring for women

He is now responsible **for** the girls and women he meets

And he must assume that responsibility

No matter how the women behave or dress in his presence

Jesus made this transition at 12 years of age (but was still subject to parents)

Apparently he had been taught well

Fathers must convey to sons the need for them to be men

Much of this is caught by example

Men, you must Be the undisputed, GENTLE head of the home

(only strong men can afford to be gentle)

If wife is head of home the children will be confused

A sinful syndrome → passive dad + aggressive mom = angry children

Require respect, not allow risqué comments and jokes

Proverbs → Instruction and commandments from father

Teaching from mother

Must require - fathers instructing and charging their sons with manhood

- sons to be absolutely respectful of sisters and mother
- mothers to let go of sons

Must give sons responsibility early – money, tasks
Allow sons to make mistakes – help pick up the pieces

Problem – There is no rite of passage

New terms have been coined – adultesence, kidult

Physically mature but emotionally and spiritually undeveloped

Advertising, media, porn cater to the adolescent, immature man
